WHEREAS, the monarch butterfly is an iconic North American species whose multigenerational migration and metamorphosis from caterpillar to butterfly has captured the imagination of millions of Americans; and

WHEREAS, 20 years ago, more than one billion Eastern monarch butterflies migrated to Mexico, but in the winter of 2014, only 60 million made the trip; and

WHEREAS, cities, towns and counties have a critical role to play to help save the monarch butterfly, and the City of Pryor Creek has played a leadership role by launching a community wildlife habitat and Monarch Waystation Project in Pryor Creek, OK; and

WHEREAS, every citizen of Pryor Creek can make a difference for the monarch by planting native milkweed and nectar plants to provide habitat for monarch and pollinators in locations where people live, work, learn, play and worship; and

WHEREAS, on behalf of the people of Pryor Creek who have already joined me in creating a healthy habitat for these magnificent butterflies, I am honored as Mayor to lead the way by signing the National Wildlife Federation's Mayor's Monarch Pledge; and I encourage other city officials across our great nation to take a stand with me so that the monarch butterfly will once again flourish across the continent.

Mayors' Monarch Pledge

The monarch butterfly is an iconic North American species whose multigenerational migration and metamorphosis from caterpillar to butterfly has captured the imagination of millions of Americans.

We, the undersigned Mayors and local government chief executives, are deeply concerned about the decline of the monarch butterfly population. Twenty years ago, more than one billion Eastern monarch butterflies migrated to Mexico. In the winter of 2014, only 60 million made the trip. The North American monarch population has declined by more than 90 percent in the past two decades. Monarch scientists attribute the decline to degradation and loss of summer breeding habitat in the U.S., and loss of winter habitat in Mexico. Western populations of monarch butterflies that overwinter in California are also in decline.

Cities, towns and counties have a critical role to play to help save the monarch butterfly. Municipalities in particular can provide habitat at public parks, median strips, community gardens and municipal buildings that serve as community hubs such as recreation centers and libraries. Schools, homes and businesses can all provide essential habitat for monarchs too. Simple changes in landscaping ordinances or school policies can make a big difference for the monarch. Educating citizens about how and where to grow milkweed is also a key piece of the puzzle. Creating habitat and educating citizens will benefit other pollinators that need healthy habitat as well.

When Mayors speak up and take a stand, citizens notice. Therefore, we hereby commit to help restore habitat for the monarch and encourage our citizens to do the same, so that these magnificent butterflies will once again flourish across the continent.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR
FAIRVIEW AND GRAHAM MEMORIAL CEMETERIES**

1. The City of Pryor Creek shall have charge of all work on lots and graves, both before and after interment has been made.
2. All prices and fees are fixed by the Park / Cemetery Board and the City Council; there will be no deviation there from.
3. No interments shall take place until all fees have been paid in full.
4. No interment shall take place on Sundays or Holidays.
5. All interments must be in caskets enclosed within a box, container, constructed of plastic, concrete, or steel. No wooden containers.
6. Two cremations allowed per one (1) lot or one (1) cremation and one (1) full size burial.
7. Cremation containers should be of concrete, steel, or plastic.
8. All graves shall be kept level with surrounding terrain.
9. Only one upright monument shall be erected upon a full lot.
10. Lots which consist of two (2) burials may contain one (1) upright monument and one (1) grass marker. All grass markers must be flush with ground.
11. Sod may be placed upon grave after direction of sexton.
12. No trees, flowers, or shrubs are to be planted without Cemetery approval.
13. Grave flowers will be picked up one week after funeral service.
14. All shepherd hooks are to be of single hook only. They are to be placed at the ends of the headstone and only hang over the stone as to not interfere with mowing. If not in compliance, the hooks will be removed by cemetery staff.
15. All decorations must be placed upon the stone or pad and off the face of the grave. (Except for Decoration Days.)
16. All decorations placed on the face of the grave will be removed one (1) week after Decoration Days.

Decoration Days include:

- ***Valentine's Day***
- ***Memorial Day***
- ***Veterans Day***
- ***Birthday Day***

Note: Decorations placed on the face of the grave will be exempt from one (1) week removal from November through January.

17. Cemetery staff will pick up all decorations off the face of the graves twice a year for maintenance. (i.e. spraying of weeds and grass and mowing.)

Pick up days include:

- ***One (1) week after Valentine's Day (weather permitting).***
- ***One (1) week after Memorial Day (weather permitting).***

Note: Decorations not picked up by dates listed will be disposed of by cemetery staff.

18. All decorations placed upon the stone or pad, will be at your own risk. These items will not be removed by Cemetery.
19. Any decorations greater than 6 feet in height require approval by the cemetery sexton, or if necessary, the Park / Cemetery Board.

Golf Course Sub-Committee composed of Bill Kannegiesser, Wayne Jones, & Pat Richard met Dec 2, 2015 at the golf course & made changes to the existing Pryor Creek Golf Course Rules #5 to read:

- 5. Appropriate/proper dress is expected at all times in Pro Shop, putting green, range and on course. No cut-off shorts of any kind and shorts must have a hem at their bottom. Gentlemen's shirts must have sleeve (no tank tops or sleeveless allowed). Only golf shoes with soft spikes or flat-soled shoes are permitted on the course. No bare feet or metal spikes allowed.***

PRYOR CREEK GOLF COURSE RULES

The following Pryor Creek Golf Course rules were established by the Pryor Creek Park Board, edited by the City Attorney and approved by the Pryor Creek City Council. Effective date of these rules shall be May 1, 2002. They shall remain in effect until amended by the Pryor Creek Park Board.

1. The Pryor Creek Golf Course shall be open every day except Thanksgiving, Christmas and those days designated by the Director of Golf and/or the Golf Course Superintendent.
2. The Director of Golf will designate one weekday morning as Ladies Day and one weekday morning as Seniors Day. The Director of Golf along with the respective association President will establish the starting times and the length of the season.
3. Opening and closing times for the course are at the discretion of the Director of Golf and/or the Golf Course Superintendent.
4. Green fees, cart fees, membership fees, trail on fees and cart stall fees will be set by the Pryor Creek Park Board and approved by the City Council.
5. Proper dress, including shirt and shoes, is required in and around the Pro shop at all times. Only golf shoes with soft spikes or flat-soled shoes are permitted on the course. No bare feet or metal spikes are allowed.
6. All players must register in the pro shop before beginning play. Members must check in and nonmembers must pay a green fee. A validated cash register receipt is to be issued to all persons paying green fees. Nonmembers are responsible for keeping this receipt on their person during play.
7. No smoking, dipping or chewing of tobacco is allowed in the pro shop. No abusive or foul language will be tolerated in or around the pro shop.
8. You may not bring any food or beverage onto the golf course.
9. No private coolers are allowed on the golf course.
10. All players must have a bag and a set of golf clubs. Rental clubs are available in the pro shop.
